Spiritual Insights Rev. Dr. William H. Edwards

*"¹⁴Above all, **clothe yourselves with love**, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. ¹⁵And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were **called in the one body**. And be thankful."
Colossians 3:14-15*

In this passage of scripture, the Apostle Paul gives us a wonderful word picture of being dressed in the clothing of Christ. He says to **"clothe yourselves with love."** Love is the deepest possible expression of the personality of God. In other words, God is Love and when we walk in God's Spirit, the garment we wear is Love.

The question is "How do we do that?" What does the garment of love look like when it is worn in the life of a Christian? What does the garment of love look like when it is worn in the life of a congregation? What does the garment of love look like when it is worn in the life of the Regional Church?

To begin to answer these questions, we must remember that our faith calls us to "love one another as God has loved us". To wear the garment of love means we are called to genuinely love God and love each other fully. When we commit ourselves to others in love, we begin to understand the love of God. And when we grasp the love of God, our response is to offer our lives to God. When we give our lives to God, we live for others, placing their needs and concerns above our own. Our love for God must help us to reach out to others; to break down the barriers that keep others outside the church; to worship God by loving others. The model of being **"clothed in love"** that Jesus leaves us is to lift up somebody who has fallen, be a friend to somebody who is friendless, feed somebody who is hungry and Love the unlovable.

Love has the power to transform every type of human relationship. As Paul told the church at Corinth:

"Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It (love) bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends." - I Corinthians 13:4-8

So Friends, **"clothe yourselves with love."** and be an instrument of God's love in all that you do. God's love calls us to be in his Church, to celebrate his presence, to love and serve others; but most of all, to proclaim Jesus Christ, crucified and risen, our Lord and Hope.

This is the inspiration for the theme of our **2010 Regional Assembly, October 15-16, 2010: "One Body: Clothed in Love" Colossians 3:14-15**

It will be held at the Columbus Marriott Northwest, 5605 Glazer Parkway, Dublin, Ohio. **Please make your plans to be a part of this gathering of the Regional Church.** This will be a time of sharing and celebrating the transforming work God is doing in the mission and ministry of our congregations and in our lives as people of faith. **I look forward to meeting you there!**

Message from Regional Associate Pastor, Rev. Dr. LaTaunya Bynum

"Back in the day", that is a few years ago, there was a brand new, contemporary song written by the team of Avery and Marsh. Part of the song says: 'I am the church, you are the church, we are the church together."

It is as we are church together that we nurture the next generation of God's people.

A young girl is encouraged by her Sunday School teacher to try a week at church camp. She does and enjoys the experience so much that she returns year after year, through Chi Rho and CYF, growing spiritually and gaining confidence in her own abilities. After high school she attends Hiram College, and attends Advance Conference events until she is too old (30 years of age) to attend any longer.

Along the way, she meets friends with whom she will be close years into the future. Together they will give new life to the church; they will be members, some will be lay leaders and others will lead from the pulpit. All of them will take the church left for them and reshape it so that it has meaning for them. The one day, a little girl and a little boy will sit in a Sunday School class room with that woman so influenced by church and camp and friendship. The teacher encourages them to give camp a try. They do, and they enjoy it, and from that day on, they begin to form friendships, and soon they will claim their inheritance of the church and reshape it for themselves and begin to reach a new generation.

"...all who follow Jesus, all around the world, yes we're the church together."

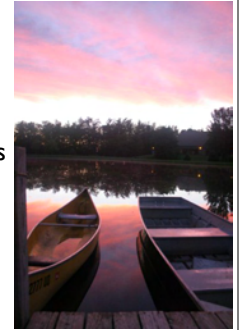
Message from Regional Associate Pastor, Rev. Stephen Bentley

One of the characters of the Bible that intrigues me is the person of Barnabas. Most of our knowledge of Barnabas comes from the book of Acts. We first meet him in Acts 4 where he sells a field and gives the proceeds to the disciples. We next hear about Barnabas when Saul has been converted and wants to meet with the disciples but they are afraid of him for fear he is still trying to kill those who follow Jesus. Barnabas befriends Saul and brings him to the disciples. He becomes Saul's (Paul's) partner in ministry. Barnabas, we are told, means "Son of Encouragement" and Barnabas lived up to his name. He helped Paul be all that he could be.

I remember hiking in Yellowstone National Park several years ago. My brother-in-law and I set out to hike about 27 miles in one day to the top of Mt. Electric. From 6000 feet, we headed to the top of Mt. Electric at 11,000 feet 13.5 miles away. I was very slow moving up steep hills in the thin air but Jeff kept encouraging me and was patient waiting for me. With his encouragement, I made it to the top. Without his support, I would have given up long before. One of our Priorities for the Christian Church in Ohio is "strengthening relationships and building networks." It is in our relationships with one another that we can be "Barnabas" for each other. As we move into 2010, consider how you might be a Barnabas for someone and how they might be a Barnabas for you. Together, as we encourage one another, we bring God's vision to reality. "Thy Kingdom come, thy will be done on earth . . ."

Message from Regional Program Minister, Rev. Dr. Brenda Webster Relationship Building 101

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets." Matthew 22: 37-40

Those of us who have even the vaguest knowledge of educational systems, know that both teaching and learning flow from the simple to the complex, from the known to the unknown. Whatever is conceptualized and processed internally will eventually be made manifest externally at some point in time, if indeed, what has been taught has been learned.

So it is with Christian relationships and relationship building. We move from what is fundamental to that which is more challenging. In our vigor to establish true and lasting relationships with each other, it is well worth the time and effort to explore Jesus' approach to relationship building.

In the scripture above, Jesus responds to a question from one of the Scribes, "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the law?" Jesus summed up all moral obligations in the word "love" which is expressed in the two-fold direction of **God** and **neighbor**. In other words, only total love for God can empower you to love *rightly* yourself and your neighbor. Relationship building begins with love and acceptance of ourselves and then moves appropriately beyond ourselves to our brothers and sisters in Christ. Realizing that this can be quite difficult, we soon find that only a genuine, personal relationship with God can enable us to do such. Then and only then will our efforts towards lasting relationship building be fruitful.

So vital the command to love God, ourselves and each other, that Jesus declared these two commandments fundamental to the proper interpretation of the Law and the Prophets.

In the Gospel according to Mark (12: 33), we notice the above scripture played out to completion. The questioning Scribe not only agrees with Jesus but places this two-fold love commandment above the whole Jewish religion. Acknowledging the Scribe's obvious enlightenment, Jesus responds, "You are not far from the Kingdom." (Mark 12:34b).

Let us resolve to heed the offerings in this scripture as we continue building loving relationships with God, ourselves and others.

The women of Ohio are eagerly awaiting Quadrennial Assembly this coming June 23-27, 2010 in Greensboro, NC. Equipping the Saints

Put the date of Saturday, March 6, 2010 on your calendars now! Equipping the Saints leadership event will be on Saturday, March 6 from 9:15 AM to 3:45 PM at North Congregational United Church of Christ, 2040 W. Henderson Rd., Columbus. The Metropolitan Commission of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the Central Southeast Ohio Association of the United Church of Christ jointly sponsor this event.

"A New Day Dawning" is the theme for this day long leadership training event for laity and clergy of the Christian Church (DOC) and United Church of Christ. The Rev. Dr. David Odell-Scott will be the morning Bible study leader. He serves as Coordinator of the Religion Studies Program at Kent State University where he also chairs the Philosophy Department. His books include "Paul's Critique of Theocracy" and "A Post-Patriarchal Christology." He is a graduate of Texas Christian University, BA. and Vanderbilt, M. Div. and PhD.

The day will be set within a pattern of worshipful work; it includes morning Bible study, a choice of two workshops, lunch with time for fellowship and exchange of ideas among churches. Complete registration information will be sent to churches in early January. The registration fee will be \$15 for the full day including lunch and workshops.

Destination Metairie!

On Sat., Oct. 24, three vehicles from Ohio and one from Florida hit the highways for destination Metairie – a western suburb of New Orleans.



These vehicles were filled with sixteen eager and excited Disciple volunteers headed for rehab work awaiting still from the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina in August of 2005. From Dayton, Wooster, Hamilton, Troy, Wadsworth and Columbus they came. In cars, a van and a church bus loaned from United Christian Church in Clayton they came... to spend five days staying at First Christian Church in Metairie Where they worked under the mission station manager, Rev. Diane Fonderlin and her husband, Tim, a United Church Of Christ construction coordinator. The group slept on air mattresses at the church, ate breakfasts and dinners there, prepared their own bag lunches in the mornings, and drove to eastern New Orleans for work each day.

Two of the women prepared all the breakfasts and dinners but went off to work each day with the rest of the team at the work sites as well! Divided into several crews the volunteers painted the exterior of a home, helped to rehab a church building that had received flood damage, and put down tile floors and finished soffits in still other houses. Quite unexpectedly they were joined for the week by two volunteers from Kentucky (Gene Coulter and Steve Campbell.) In the evenings the group shared in vespers and then relaxed playing games of Mexican Train, Touring and Phase Ten. On Wed. night the host church provided dinner for the group and church members mixed with the volunteers at the tables for fellowship and getting acquainted. On Thur. night most of the group made a visit to Bourbon Street and the French Quarter to have a brief New Orleans experience.

During the week we learned that all but one of our Disciple Mission Stations along the Katrina battered Gulf Coast will be closed by the end of this year. (The U.C.C.'s and some other groups will be continuing.) It's not because the work is finished but rather because the funding has dried (been used) up.

On the Honor Role is most certainly United Christian Church of Clayton for not only loaning its church bus but for providing the funds for its fuel as well! FCC, Zanesville holds a Fair Trade Fair

Members of First Christian Church Zanesville held a Fair Trade Fair on Sunday November 15th in their Fellowship Hall. This event included Fair Trade coffee samples and light refreshments, a video explaining the Fair Trade concept, and Fair Trade products for purchase. In addition the Youth Groups offered Fair Trade gift bags for sale to help raise money for mission projects.

First Christian has participated in the Equal Exchange Disciples Coffee Project since February, 2009 and to date has sold more than 500 bags of coffee. Each purchase supports Week of Compassion. We planned to make coffee available during the month of February as part of our Week of Compassion emphasis but the response was so great that we have made it an ongoing project.

Fair Trade ensures that people along every step of the supply chain receive fair wages, that workers and communities are treated with dignity, and that artisans and producers take steps to preserve the environment. The Fair Trade economy is based on justice, dignity, empowerment, transparency, and respect for people and the planet. Ron Hooker, recently retired, provides greatly valued leadership as Chair of MACC's Personnel Committee and led the 2009 planning retreat. The Columbus Council is undergoing major transformation following the recent death of its full-time Executive Director, Mr. Alvin Hadley and the loss of significant funding from its supporting judicatories. MACC remains alive and well and is reconstructing for important ministries to and with the Greater Columbus community.
