

Spiritual Insights Rev. Dr. William H. Edwards

"They spent their time learning from the apostles, and they were like <u>family</u> to each other. They also broke bread and prayed together." Acts 2:42 (Contemporary Version)

This verse teaches us an important truth about the church:

The church is a family. It is not a building. It is not a club. It is not an organization or institution. It is not a religion. It is a family. It is God's family. Christianity means, not only relating to God, it means relating to other people who are also followers of Christ. When you join the church, you become a part of a family. God says that Christian life can only be lived in relationship to other Christians. Therefore, living out the spiritual journey is done in the context of "true community".

That is why I am excited about the vision we have in the Christian Church in Ohio. "In covenant together, we are gifted and called to become a true community"

In the book of Acts we see the formation of the church -the community of Christ's followers "living out the spiritual
journey" -- who were so devoted and filled with the love of
Christ that people from all over the world, from all walks of life,
all ethnic and cultural backgrounds were impacted and drawn
into this new community, and transformed by what they experienced.

I believe that God is calling us to become that kind of community of faith as a Regional Church -- a community so filled with the Holy Spirit, so transformed by the love of Jesus Christ, and so yielded to the power of the Spirit in our lives that people in our world would be drawn in and transformed by what they experience in our churches. The presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in our community makes it possible for what happened in and through the church in the book of Acts to happen in and through us in our world today!

Message from Regional Associate Pastor, Rev. Dr. LaTaunya Bynum

The poet Robert Browning wrote, "Ah, but a man's reach should exceed its grasp, or what's a heaven for." Likewise our vision should exceed what we can see with our physical eyes or experience in our physical world. In the church, vision is about how, by the power of the Holy Spirit, God shows us what can be and how we can be a true community, embodying a spirituality that is built on our foundation with Jesus Christ, along with a passion for justice. What vision for your congregation has God given you?

Here is one vision for the church. It is from Bill Thomas, a Columbus native who grew up in Woodland Christian Church. He has lead the singing at the last several General Assemblies and at one of them he shared a song he wrote about his vision for the church. In "I See a Church", he describes his vision:

"I see a church with a vision, I see a church on a mission. I see a church with its doors open wide, and the poor and the rich worship God side by side, and the young and the old have both put down their pride, and yes we who are different don't have to hide, and all of God's children can sweetly abide..." I share Bill's vision for the church, its doors open wide to receive all those looking for a place to worship and serve. Those doors open out so that we can go out into the world as sons and daughters of God, serving all of the people of God.

Our reach can exceed our grasp, our vision can exceed our sight, that is what heaven and earth are for.

Message from Regional Associate Pastor, Rev. Stephen Bentley

This past weekend I had the joy of leading retreats at two of our congregations. We began each retreat reading the story of the Transfiguration from Matthew 17:1-9. What a fantastic experience it must have been for these men of Jewish heritage to be standing in the very presence of the two pillars of their faith and their master, Jesus. It was indeed a mountain top experience; one they would have wanted to last a life time. One wonders if they were not secretly giving thanks that they were named among the elite few chosen to witness such an event. How quickly those back down the mountain are forgotten in the midst of such a great experience. "True Community" was their very present. There was no need to look elsewhere. "True Community" was Jesus, Moses, and Elijah, with the three disciples.

Both groups shared how the church is very much like Peter and James and John. In some sense, we had built tabernacles and in them we worshiped the Most High God. "True Community" became for us that community within the church building. Over time, the community outside the church was forgotten and changed drastically.

As the disciples are challenged to be true community by coming down the mountain back to that group they had forgotten, so the church is called to an ever expanding understanding of what "true community" is all about. It is about being in relationship with the community right at our doorsteps. Yet it is even larger. It is about building relationships with other congregations and sharing experiences as a way of strengthening each other's ministry. It is about building relationship of caring, sharing, hoping, and dreaming with the purpose of building a stronger ministry in each of our local contexts.

Join us in covenant together, as we recognize our giftedness and calling to be the "True Community" God is calling us to be.

Please bring to share for the evening snacks; A-F: Fruit / G-M: Veggies / N-Z: Cookies



I find Adult Conference to be a place where you are made to feel as one of God's treasures. Adult Conference is full of endless possibilities where faith is deepened and broadened. The theme this year is: "Not Locked In: Reaching Within and Beyond."

As usual, this 74th Adult Conference promises to be a great gathering where conferees are free to explore issues openly and honestly, without judgment. That is the way I found them to be, and that is one of the many reasons I am excited and looking forward to arriving at the destination of Northwest Christian Church on June 27, 2011! Looking forward to meeting you there.

Congregational Transformation

Taking into consideration the complexity of Congregational Transformation and the diverse nature of the conditions and scenarios that congregations within the Christian Church in Ohio find themselves, the Regional Church's Congregational Transformation Ministry Team believes that there is no one single "cure all" approach. The role of the Regional Church is to be a partner to resource pastors and congregations as they discern their own unique "spiritual strategic journey" of transformation. Therefore, the Congregational Transformation Ministry Team has developed a Regional Church model of support that will educate and train leaders, identify and utilize resources, and network congregations and pastors to share their learnings and experiences. This model of support is comprised in networks:

Network of Leaders

A key component of the model is the development of a "Leadership Network" for pastors who have covenanted to become "Transformational Leaders". The leadership network will be intentional in:

- Sharing the outcomes of congregational insights related to the use of transformation resources;
- Creating a "community of learning' through the use of "webinars", so that training and vision casting events for transformation can be held without requiring travel. (Webinars are events held with the combination of conference call and internet-based presentation);
- Writing articles on the topic Congregational Transformation for the Buckeye Disciple and sharing experiences at regional events.

Network of Congregations

Another component of Regional Church support of congregational transformation is the development and facilitation of a "resource network" among congregations who make a formal decision and a Covenant with the Regional Church to become a

"Transforming Congregation."

The Pastoral Staff and the Congregational Transformation Team will closely monitor the activity of the **congregational network** and offer recommendations by evaluating new transformation resources and sharing the results with the pastoral and congregational leadership networks.

Network of Coaches

Coaching is an exciting way to draw out from within pastors and leaders the gifts and skills for transformation. The Congregational Transformation Team considers coaching perhaps the single most important resource for transformation and leadership development available for pastors and congregations. The Christian Church in Ohio has trained and developed a support network of coaches to work with pastors and congregational pastors committed to Transformation.

Mantua Center Christian Church recently hosted Dr. Eyamba Bokamba, a native of the Democratic Republic of the Congo and current Professor of Linguistics at the University of Illinois, for a lecture and showing of a documentary on his homeland. Dr. Bokamba also delivered a moving Sunday morning message on the story of the Good Samaritan.

Dr. Bokamba, accompanied by his wife Molingo, covered many topics over the course of their weekend visit, including the history and culture of the Congo and the role that the Christian community has played in alleviating poverty and providing health care and education for the Congolese people. He also shared difficult and sobering stories of war and colonialism, the cruel exploitation of the Congo by western countries for its vast natural resources, and the predatory practices of neighboring African governments.

The Bokambas also offered their own life stories as examples of the outreach efforts of the Disciples of Christ, as both were educated in the Congo by schools founded by the church and came to the US to study under the sponsorship of the denomination. The Disciples presence in the Congo dates back to the late 1800's, and today there are over 650,000 Congolese Disciples.

This was the second visit to MCCC from a representative of the Congo. Maman Nzeba, who serves as the Director of the Dept of Woman & Family for the Church of Christ, spoke with the congregation in June of 2010 about her efforts to strengthen families and empower women in the Congo.

Inspired by these stories, MCCC member Linda Idoine will be traveling to the Congo this summer for a firsthand look at the outreach efforts supported by The Week of Compassion, the humanitarian and disaster relief arm of the Disciples of Christ.

Disciples reach out to Japanese earthquake victims

Week of Compassion, the Disciples relief, refugee and development mission fund, is providing financial assistance to our sisters and brothers in Japan following the earthquake and tsunami on March II that has left the island nation dealing with sev-



eral crises, including flooding and radiation poisoning emitting from a nuclear facility. At this writing, it is estimated that deaths from the disaster may exceed 18,000 people. More than 400,000 are living in makeshift shelters or evacuation centers.



Through Global Ministries, the common witness of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Christ, Week of Compassion has already responded to our primary partner, the United Church of Christ in Japan (UCCJ), with an initial emergency response grant and continues to channel funds as requests are made by GM

partners. The UCCJ has established a relief committee and is currently researching, planning and launching an appropriate response. Global Ministries missionary, Jeffrey Mensendiek, is based in Sendai and working with the UCCJ in spearheading their response to this disaster.
