### Spiritual Insights Rev. Dr. William H. Edwards

*"On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh." - Matthew 2:11*

In the second chapter of the Gospel of Matthew, we find the story of the magi – the wise men. The two things that seem to be spotlighted are that 1) these men came from afar to honor Christ. They committed a lot time and money to take this trip. 2) They brought Jesus gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. Now why would the gifts be noted and none of those other details? Many biblical scholars believe that it was because the gifts honored Christ in three distinct ways.

1. The gift of gold acknowledged the Kingship of Christ. Gold was a gift that denoted royalty, authority, and power.
2. The gift of frankincense acknowledged the Priestly Ministry of Christ. Frankincense was valuable incense used in the offerings in the temple. The incense added a dimension of beauty to the worship. It added a fragrant aroma to the sacrifices. Frankincense also was added to the oil that anointed the priests.
3. The gift of myrrh acknowledged the sacrificial nature of Christ. Myrrh is an interesting gift. In the Old Testament we see it used as a fragrance. In the New Testament in John 19:39 we see Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea preparing Jesus for burial using a mixture of aloes and myrrh, a sort of embalming ointment. Myrrh points to the sacrificial death of Jesus.

I wonder if we fully understand the significance of these gifts, that they were designed by God to carry a symbolic meaning that has significant implications on how we worship and honor Christ in our lives.

The Question is: What gifts do we bring? What is a right an appropriate gift to honor Christ? What do you we give the one who made and owns everything?

Whatever we do to honor Christ, I believe we should make sure it is personal; make sure it is from the heart - an honest desire to honor and worship the Lord. Jesus said in Matthew 22:37-38,

*"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the greatest and first commandment.*

Look at the wise men. They used their time and personal resources to take a long journey to lay their gifts before Christ.

Our best gifts are the gifts of ourselves, something personal. In fact, it could be argued that the gold, frankincense and myrrh of the wise men seem trivial and quite useless for the God of all creation, and the savior of all people. After all, He has all the gold and frankincense and myrrh he ever needs. After all, he is the creator and owner of all these gifts. But as useless as these gifts may seem to be for God, they are a sign of the way the wise men gave of themselves. They went into the house, and

when they saw the child with his mother Mary, they knelt down and worshipped. Here are these men, learned wealthy scholars of the east, kneeling at alter of the true God. Even as they paid homage, they would have realized that even the gift of themselves is something far too small for this King of kings.

What we give to our Lord may seem so trivial and modest and poor, but if they are representative of the giving of ourselves to God, this is our most important gift. Even then this is still so small in comparison to what God has given us. Nevertheless, the gift of ourselves is the best gift we can give.

When the wise men found Jesus, they brought gifts which meant they were prepared to meet the newborn King. The wise men were wise not only because they followed the star that led to Jesus, but they were wise because they were prepared to meet Jesus when they found him.

What kind of preparations are we making to meet Jesus? What are we carrying along with us on our journey? What Gifts do we bring? Is what we are carrying in our hearts suitable to be laid before the King of kings?

Before the presence of Christ you can lay your songs of praise, your two hours a week as a volunteer for a charity, your weekly visit to those who are elderly, sick, and lonely. You bring before the Christ-child your gift of the words of comfort you offered a discouraged person, or your spontaneous and overflowing response of joy because of God's overflowing love toward us. In other words, lay before the presence of Christ, your gift of yourself and your time to the work of God. The gift of "ourselves" is our gift of gold, frankincense and myrrh, something valuable, sacrificial and personal.

Did you make a New Year's resolution? Perhaps you have resolved to lose some weight, quit smoking, watch TV less, exercise more. God bless you and much success in your efforts. But while you are making resolutions, don't forget to add spiritual growth.

Think of feeding and growing your spirit in the same way as you have fed and grown your body. Only feed the spirit with these practices:

Pray – talk to God about all that makes you grateful, hopeful, fearful, and anxious, then listen to how God responds to your prayers.

Fast – can we do without some things in order to gain clarity, do for others, let go to make room for a God who provides for us over and over again?

Study scripture – read for new insights and new challenges; take the Bible seriously enough to learn the story of how God loves without condition, redeems all open to God, and teaches us that every person matters, and that the sign of our love for God is in how we love others.

Worship – honor God who is worthy of our praise and thanksgiving.

Give – the story of Jesus is of One who gave all he had for the sake of the world. Surely we can give, even in tough times as we share the blessings God has given us with others.

**Message from Regional Associate Pastor, Rev. Stephen Bentley**

From Advent and Christmas, we move now into the transition season of Epiphany. This transition season moves us from the Christmas themes of innocence, birth, and the coming of Christ to the Lenten themes of sacrifice and the cost of God's love. Transitions call us to refocus who we are, where we are, and where we are going. The Bible teaches us that when leaders went through transition times, they first spent time in prayer. When Elijah transitioned from the fearful prophet running from Queen Jezebel, he went into the desert and prayed and God spoke to him in a "...still small voice." As Jesus transitioned from his life before baptism to his calling, he went into the desert for 40 days where he fasted and prayed. Before the disciples could transition from a group meeting behind closed, locked doors to an empowered church, they spent time in prayer. So we come today to a time of transition not just in church seasons. Our nation is about to transition from one president to another. Many of our Ohio churches have made the decision to seek transformation: To transition from what they were/are to what God is calling them to be now and into the future. As a General, Regional, and local church, may we follow the Biblical example and enter into prayer for each of these transitions. This year, I invite you share in the many different ways the Regional Church offers churches and individuals the opportunity to pray. We encourage pastors to attend the Spiritual Life Retreat in February as a way of refocusing for the Lenten Season ahead. (Pastor's spouses also are invited to attend.) Retreats for Advance, CYF State Convention, Disciples Men, Women's Ministries, and Disciples Fellowship are all opportunities for us to pause and refocus on who we are as people of God. Come, take advantage of one or more opportunities and be transformed.

**New Church DVD On Disciples Identity And Beliefs Is Now Available**

Communication Ministries has produced a new Church-wide DVD entitled "A Movement for Wholeness" that can be used in churches for new member orientation, discussion at men's or women's meetings or for general church use.

### Treasurer's Corner

At our recent Regional Assembly I was joined by Rev. Randy Clay and Mr. Braden Gueth in leading a Workshop on Strengthening our Congregations through Technology. I wish to once again thank Randy and Braden for their time and expertise in leading these sessions.

The two sessions were well attended and quite interactive. So much so that I believe it is valuable to share some of the discussion. One concern I heard was how many of our congregations are being solicited by service bureaus regarding their finance and accounting procedures. Their intent is to encourage the congregation to consider outsourcing their processing to an outside service provider. That may or may not make sense and requires detailed analysis to understand the benefits and costs associated with such a decision. My real concern is that many of these solicitations are using scare tactics to make their point, referencing the threat of criminal charges to those who are not in full compliance with standard accounting and financial procedures.

The Regional Office can help if you have concerns about your current practices regarding accounting or financial processes. We have requested procedures from our congregations that we can make available for your review. We can also facilitate discussions with other congregations of similar size or with similar issues. I have visited congregations at their invitation to review and discuss practices and procedures that we have in place at the Regional office. We can also assist in helping understand some of the key issues regarding costs and benefits in outsourcing as compared to retaining the functions within the congregation.

I truly believe the opportunity exists to strengthen our congregations using technology in an effective and cost efficient manner. You can help by sharing your current practices and procedures with us at the Regional office so that we may catalog them for reference. This information will be maintained confidentially and all references to the church and any individual will be deleted. Please take a moment to send an email to my attention [ddraper@ccinoh.org](mailto:ddraper@ccinoh.org) with the following information.

- Accounting: What software are you using currently for posting contributions and expenses?
- Finance: What bank(s) are you currently using?
- Technology: Who is your Web provider or is it maintained by a volunteer?
- Contacts: Please identify the person and the contact information, i.e. email or phone number.
- Questions: Please let us know if there are any questions we may be able to answer or research on your behalf.

## Disciples equip ecumenical efforts

Disciples are providing leadership for the greater Columbus Metropolitan Area Church Council (MACC). Rev. Ken Coy recently became President of the MACC Board. He has served several terms as its Vice-President. Pastor Jerry Miller, a licensed minister, has been appointed by the Board to serve as its "Community Representative". Dr. Eric Brown, Board member, continues to give excellent leadership as Chair of MACCs "Racial Unity Services"- one of the very important and lively ministries of the Ecumenical body.

Another of MACC's featured programs is the annual Living Faith Awards Breakfast at Capital University. Each May this enterprise recognizes and celebrates the ministries of Ten Outstanding Lay Persons from across greater Columbus - with citations from the Governor, the Mayor and the honoree's personal faith testimonies. Just a few years ago MACC helped give birth to the now very strong and active Central Ohio Interfaith Council.

Columbus, like many ecumenical bodies, is experiencing the very difficult times of decreased interest and reduced resources which accompany current "Unity" efforts. The MACC Board is committed to refocus endeavors to empower the affirmation that, as Christians, we are called by Christ to seek and do together those ministries that none of us can do alone. We treasure your prayers to give wings to our continuing ecumenical posture.

Also, in Central Ohio, the Ecumenical Concerns Committee of the Central Southeast Association of the United Church of Christ and Disciples are partnering together for ecumenical enterprises. Among our programs are:

*"Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" Matthew 6:21.*

## Disciple's Men Cookin' for Mission

For years, the International Day of Pancakes has been a successful vehicle to pair up Disciples Men's groups from across the country to projects that will directly impact the lives of children across our denomination. Disciples Men have answered the call to get involved in children's lives to make a difference. Now the Disciples Men are responding to another much needed call. Due to financial limitations, Disciples Home Missions has been forced to eliminate the funding that partially supported the budgets of four missions centers. The centers that have been greatly affected by this cutback are: Yakama Christian Mission center in White Swan, Washington; Inman Christian Mission Center in San Antonio, Texas; All Peoples Christian Center in Los Angeles and the Kentucky Appalachian Ministry.

The Executive Committee of the General Conference of Disciples Men, in February of 2008, voted to approve a transformation of this vital program and the distribution of funds. Beginning in 2009 all funds collected from the International Day of Pancakes will be distributed to all four of the mission centers previously mentioned. Since all four mission centers directly affect the children who live in these areas, the basic purpose of the program will not change, only how the funds are distributed. Pancake breakfasts are recommended, but not essential. Your local men's group can choose to have a fish fry, pig roast, yard sale or even a ham and yam dinner. Be creative in how your group raises money. All monies received January 1 through December 31 will be distributed the following year.

The mission of the Yakama Christian Mission is to be a visible sign of God's presence, by offering gifts of love and ministry to all who seek spiritual nurture and support. Ministry of the mission is accomplished through worship, pastoral care, and its program ministries. Program ministries with children are a high priority of the mission and include Christian education, with an extensive Vacation Bible School for the children in the community, and recreation using the new basketball courts and playground.

Through the work of Dr. Samuel Guy Inman, Christian Woman's Board of Missions of the Christian Church founded Inman Christian Center in 1913. A neighborhood based Community Center, Inman seeks to serve the needs of low-income children and families who live near the Center and around the Westside of San Antonio.

The mission of All Peoples Christian Center is to continue to provide a broad spectrum of social services to all, regardless of faith or race, and to empower the community to meet its needs by promoting equality, unity, respect and self determination among all who participate in its programs.

Kentucky Appalachian Ministry works to develop specific ways the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) can join with other denominations in regional ecumenical ministry; discover ways to relate to the special social and economic needs of Kentucky Appalachian people as they work together in church and community-based organizations; and to serve the wide church by sharing distinctive gifts and experiences from the people and congregations of the area.

### **A Year of Celebrations in Boardman**

It has been a great year at Disciples Christian Church (Boardman) in 2008. This congregation has had a lot to celebrate, with two great achievements – a Mission project, and a 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of ministry.

In the spring a Mission trip was proposed to the elders, with the projected details to be worked out. One Sunday during our stewardship and offering time we chose to do something very different. After a message from our pastor about the parable of the talents given in Matthew 25, where Jesus taught that to be loyal servants we must make our talents grow, instead of taking up a normal offering, the church elders came forward and distributed an envelope to everyone. Upon opening it, the congregation found a crisp new \$50 bill, along with instructions asking them to invest the “talents” given to them in some way that would grow the amount to a point where we could send members of our congregation on a mission trip to New Orleans to help rebuilding efforts from hurricane Katrina. It wasn't long before the talents of the congregation began to emerge, organizing dinners, carnivals, rummage sales, a book sales and car washes. Quilts, crocheted items and homemade baked goods were for sale, landscaping services, home cooked meals, candy bars and hand picked fresh strawberries were being offered. After distributing almost \$4,500 to the members, we received back over \$14,000 in just over two months. People who didn't realize the talent they possessed, or perhaps hadn't been motivated to try something different, or push their own comfort zone did so in order to support this fundraising. This project helped so many grow in their faith in the Lord and realize that they have much more to offer than they may have realized.

A team of thirteen members drove the 22 hour trip to First Christian Church of Metairie, Louisiana, which they would call home for five days. They had been excited to arrive, but were struck silent looking at all the devastation that still existed – abandoned, destroyed and demolished buildings everywhere one looked. The group was comprised of 10 adults and 3 youth. Two members provided two meals each day for the group. The workers were directed by the folks at the St. Bernard Project, and worked in a community just east of the lower ninth ward which was one of the most heavily flooded. Of the almost 26,000 private homes in that area, only 6 were inhabitable after the storm. The group was divided in two, with half going to one home to drywall, but because one member was a professional electrician, the other half was asked to completely wire a different home. Though the temperature each day was above 100 degrees, and the days long, no one wanted to go back to the church when it was time to stop for the day. By the end of the week the two houses were drywalled and ready for electrical inspection. The group became well acquainted with one homeowner who had been living in a FEMA trailer on her property for the last three years, since she had been unable to evacuate because of a brain aneurysm suffered just weeks before the storm. She told of helicopters passing over her and her baby granddaughter again and again before being rescued, with water levels in the area reaching 10+ feet -- a heart wrenching story.

This was an amazing and rewarding experience on so many levels, the tangible help they were able to offer, and the coming together as a family of the team members, creating a bond of those 13 members that cannot be expressed. The group shared some of their experiences during worship several weeks later, and all concurred that whatever you choose to give of yourself, if given from your heart and for God – God will return to you in such abundance that you will not be able to comprehend it.

The second big celebration occurred on September 14<sup>th</sup>, a celebration of 50 years of ministry of the Boardman Christian Church, now called Disciples Christian Church following the joining of a number of folks from the closing of Central Christian Church, and the merger of the First Christian Church on Youngstown, in 2004. The original charter members stepped out in faith in 1958, in breaking away from another local church, over issues of disagreement. The Anniversary Sunday was very memorable, with a number of the original charter members in attendance, many past members, and former pastors - Rev. Jerry Sullivan, Rev. Randy Johnson, who gave the message in worship, and Rev. Jim Schimmel were honored. A celebratory dinner followed, with much visiting, reminiscing, and fellowship. A souvenir ceramic mug with the pictures of the 3 churches, and a Memory Book, comprised of “Memories” submitted by many people were given to all. Posters of photos through the years were enjoyed. A number of those in attendance were over 90 years of age, the eldest two being 96. What a joyful day it was!

Disciples Christian Church has much to celebrate, and so much more ministry to look forward to, in answering the call of the Lord. All thanks and praise be to God!

## Cardboard Box City

Howland Community Church in Warren was the site of a Cardboard Box City which began at 4:00 pm on Saturday, October 25 and ran to 7:00 am on Sunday, October 26. The purpose of the Cardboard Box City was to bring awareness to the homeless problem that exists in the Warren/Youngstown area and to raise funds for Family Promise of Mahoning Valley. The evening's activities included a soup kitchen, entertainment by Unmeasured Grace and a candlelight vigil. Approximately, 40 people spent the night in the cold, sleeping in boxes and keeping warm by a fire. There was a certain amount of complaining about the cold but all were aware that the homeless must deal with much worse.

Family Promise of Mahoning Valley is a community response to homeless families. With 5 - 8 families being turned away from shelters each week, the need for a family shelter in the area is enormous. Family Promise hopes to alleviate some of that need opening in the Spring of 2009. The Cardboard Box City raised over \$2000 for the cause, helping to bring the opening date closer.

Family Promise relies on 13 congregations to host on a weekly rotation. Each host congregation provides lodging, three meals daily and welcoming hospitality. Guests will use a local day center from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, where the Family Promise director will provide case management services. Among other things, the day center will provide guests with a mailing address and a base for housing and employment searches.

Volunteers from each congregation are the heart of the program. Volunteers provide various services including cooking and serving meals, playing with children or helping them with homework, and interacting with guests with respect and compassion. Two volunteers stay overnight with the families.

The churches that have committed to Family Promise of Mahoning Valley to date include Howland Community Church, Howland United Methodist Church, Niles First Christian Church, Blessed Sacrament Catholic Community, Central Christian Church and Niles First United Methodist Church. 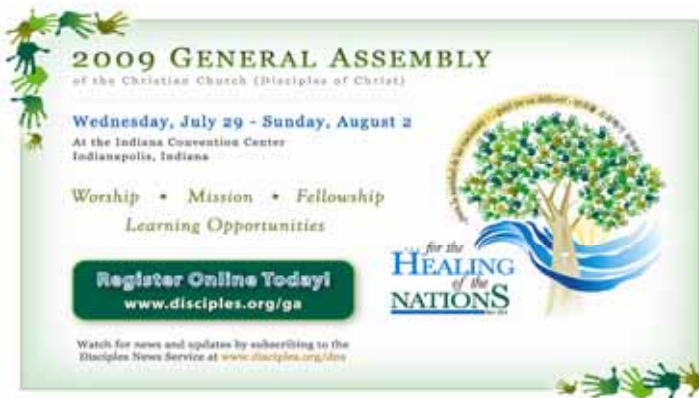

### The 10th Anniversary of DCDC

#### *History of Donkoi Children Development Center 5 little hammers and lots of nails*

One day in March 1998, I came to Mr. Khamvanh's house in Donkoi village and found little boys of grades 4 and 5 of Donkoi primary school fixing the school's tables and benches excitedly with one big hammer and some big nails.

I thought, wow! How wonderful this farmer carpenter villager is! He took initiative to do this job without anyone's suggestion. I thought again, "wouldn't it be wonderful if there was a carpenter club in the school so the boys could play with wood?" I spontaneously asked the children, "would you like more hammers?" They all said "Yes", so that was it! The young carpenter group was born. We began with five little hammers and a lot of little nails. I told Mr. Khamvanh if he could bring some bigger youths to help him fix the tables and benches while the little boys just played with the hammers, nails, and wood. Mr. Khamvanh bought a 'tuktuk' (small vehicle that carries passengers short distances) full of scrap wood and that summer of 1998 children of Donkoi primary school had a wonderful time creating anything they wanted to, no need to fix tables and benches. That was how Donkoi school's after-school program began: five little hammers, lots of nails and a skilled carpenter with a very good heart.
