The pastoral staff with their knowledge, caring, guiding spirit in helping congregations wherever they are on the journey of being the church God wills us to be. The staff, both paid and volunteer, at Camp Christian who reach literally hundreds of people each and every

Spiritual Insights Rev. Dr. William H. Edwards

The biblical text for the 2010 Christmas offering is a great passage of Scripture. For in John 3:16 we find these words, which are the meat and meaning of the whole Bible, *“For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.*

We serve a God who gave. God so loved the world that he gave. God caused a portion of God's self to become flesh, and heaven announced that his name should be called Jesus. Yes, God so loved, and so gave, that whosoever believes, even now, in God's way of giving and loving, shall discover a quality of life that shall not perish.

However, God calls us to make a faithful and loving response to God's love for us. When we receive God's love, we will discover that it is shaped like a cross, with the vertical beam that reaches up to God and gets grace and power, and with the horizontal arms it shares that power and that love and that joy all around. That is why God's love is demonstrated in the drama of the cross.

Because God so loved the world, God has called us through Christ's church to reach out to enhance the life of the world around us. Because we believe that everyone matters to God and therefore everyone matters to us.

That's why we are to pay a tithe and bring an offering to the church, not to pay God for God's blessings, but to say thank you to the Lord by giving generously to Christ's church. When I give, I say thank you, Lord, for your countless blessings. Thank you, Lord, for sweet Communion, for pardon, for your presence, for your power. Thank you, Lord, for providing for all of my needs. Thank you, Lord, for allowing me to serve you as a Christian Steward. Most of all, thank you, Lord, for Jesus Christ, my Redeemer. God, who is a God of love, is waiting for our loving response.

When we are able to receive God's love, our loving response is to live a life style of love. For the love we pay to others represents the love we owe to God, the respect we pay to others is a genuine respect for the holiness of God present in God's people.

There is a contemporary praise song that really captures this for me. The words are:

How can I say that I love the Lord,
Who I never ever seen before.
And forget to say that I love the one,
Who I walk beside each and every day
How can I look upon your face,
And ignore God's love, you I must embrace
You're my brother,
You're my sister,
And I love you with the love of the Lord

Love for the Lord means love also for God people, and God's people include all the people of the world.

“For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life”. - John 3:16

At the Quadrennial Assembly this past June, high school age young women from regions throughout the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) wearing t-shirts, pajama bottoms and sneakers sang songs early in the morning as women waited for the plenary hall doors to open. They were still singing in the evening as weary women, after a day of speeches, presentations, workshops, and meals waited for an open spot in one of the crowded elevators. They also moved carts full of health and hygiene kits, helped to direct people to the many places they needed to be, and they participated in worship. They volunteered their time as stewards and the attendees at Quadrennial were blessed by their enthusiasm and their helpfulness.

On a regular basis, women and men in the Christian Church in Ohio give of themselves. They serve at church camp, on Regional committees and commissions, and task forces. They sing in church choirs, serve on congregational boards, bring delicious food to potlucks, and communion to the homebound. They preach every Sunday, sit vigil with families in hospitals, celebrate and mourn with people whom they are called to serve.

Why? They do it because they heard a great love story one day. It was the story of God's love for the world, a love so deep, and wide, and high that it embraces the whole world. God gave to us, our lives, our hope, our church, a Savior. We give because God still gives so much to us. We can do nothing else in response to God's great love for us.

As I graduated by high school that year I cashed it in. Dad and I traveled from our home in Beavercreek, OH to Louisville, KY in our family canoe. That trip holds lots of memories but the best one is of the LOVE of my Father. No, my Graduation/Christmas present was not a new car or some other object. My present was 1 week of undivided attention from my Dad. His time was the most expensive gift he could have given me and it was just what I needed as I was about to enter into the world on my own. That gift of his presence was the best gift I have ever received and certainly the one I cherish the most.

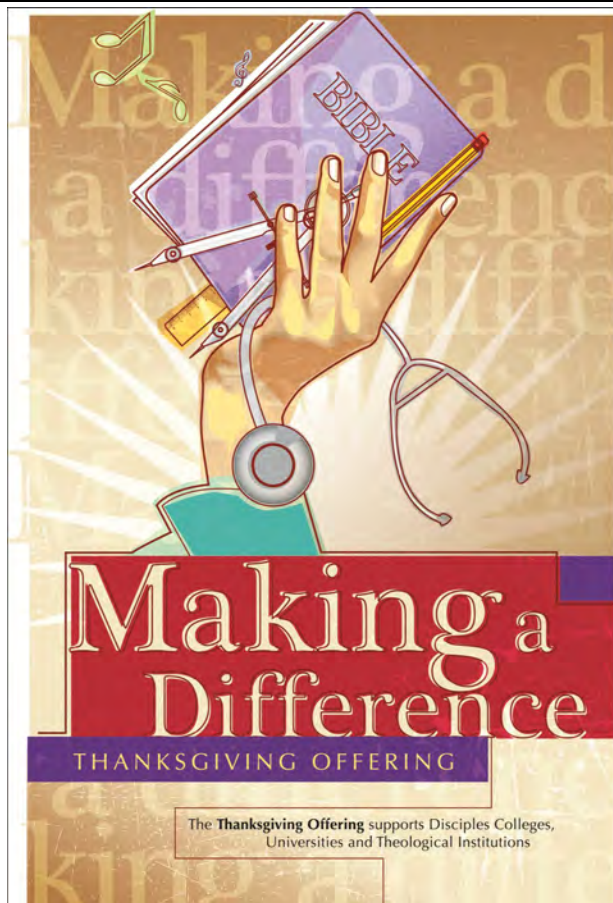

World AIDS Day December 1st 2010

HIV and AIDS need to be in our hearts and minds throughout the year. World AIDS DAY is one of the many opportunities we have to create awareness and response. The first observance of World AIDS Day was in 1988 and on the first of December. Each year since then, people, governments, corporations, churches, nonprofit organizations, and other agencies from around the globe and from all walks of life have gathered to participate in World AIDS Day events. These events help us to remember those who have died, those who are living with HIV and AIDS, those who are in the trenches of response, and all who are affected—which is all of us. One way or another we are all affected by HIV.



World AIDS Day events remind us that despite the silence, HIV has not gone away; in fact, it has increased and is increasing. Unless we work together to stop it, it will continue to claim the lives of the most vulnerable people throughout the world on a scale beyond what anyone on earth has ever experienced or imagined.

The church needs to be present on World AIDS Day, recognizing that everyday AIDS is present in the world. Receive the invitation to become involved through this special message from the Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu, Anglican Archbishop Emeritus of Cape Town:

"HIV/AIDS is devastating our communities in Southern Africa and in many other parts of the world. The Church needs to be present and to be known to be present where there is suffering, pain and despair. I pray that you will be guided by the Holy Spirit to speak the truth in love and to pour balm on wounds. May each of you bring the light of Christ and the love of God to your neighbors so you will bring hope and healing to a broken world."

Living With Loss During the Holidays

November 20 - Christian Theological Seminary

In this workshop for caregivers, Ministers, congregational leaders, social workers, and anyone seeking continuing education or growth during difficult times, Dr. Moseley offers perspective on the challenge of living with loss during the holidays. Loss is a constant, but its pain intensifies during this season of festivities. Neither families nor congregations are immune. Moseley helps participants explore responses they can make to their own grief as well as to that of loved ones, neighbors and clients. By attending to pain and emptiness at this significant time of year, learn to explore the possibilities for your own life as well as for those in your community.

Simple Gifts

Serve God with gladness! Come into God's presence with singing! Psalm 100:2

When the two of us headed to China for the first time, in 2006, we understood it would likely be for one year and possibly two. As it turned out, we lived and worked in China for four years, and we can say with all our hearts that we have been deeply blessed! It is our hope that we too have been a blessing.

We spent three years as visiting professors at the Nanjing Union Theological Seminary, then last year, took on new assignments, this time in the magnificent city of Shanghai at Shanghai University and at the YMCA. Our work in Shanghai had one aspect that was very different from that at the Nanjing Seminary; most of our students and the people we interacted with were non-Christians and even atheists. In most cases it was not that they had chosen to be "against" religion but only that they did not have a religion! Learning this brought immediately to my mind an old hymn we used to sing as children in Canada. Its second verse went like this.

How kind was our savior to bid these children welcome.

*But there are many thousands who have never heard His name.
The Bible they have never read. They know not that the Savior said:
"Suffer little children to come unto me."*

In Shanghai, we were living among the people, and seeing them as gentle, kind and giving - but without any religion, many never having heard the name of Jesus. We were not permitted to proselytize, as the Chinese government does not allow it. Still, there was no reason why could not talk about Christianity and, maybe even more importantly, to try to model in as simple and sincere a way as possible just how a Christian behaves. It was easy to love and serve the Chinese people, as they were always so good to us. This gave us pause to think about who we are and what we need to do as Christians in the world.

Let us pray, that in this season of giving we remember what a blessing each individual gift of service and love is to others.

Doreen & Michael McFarlane served as visiting professors at the Nanjing Union Theological Seminary. Doreen taught Biblical Hebrew, Greek, & Biblical interpretation. Michael served as choir director and taught western sacred music. Later, in Shanghai as visiting professor in the history department of the Shanghai University, teaching American Culture and American Religion, and Michael as choir director and concert coordinator of a branch of the Shanghai YMCA.

Cleveland Christian Home "Your Other Family"

There's a child and family services organization in Cuyahoga County with your name written all over it.

The word "Christian" in Cleveland Christian Home (CCH) speaks volumes about the nearly 110 year history of partnership between CCH and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). Ohio Disciples, in particular, have benefited from our services and donated generously to our mission.

The "Cleveland" part of our name is a bit misleading. Yes, our historic residential facility still sits proudly where "Mom" Thorpe once ran the Home's orphanage. But Ohio's last orphanage closed in the 1970s. Today's CCH has branched out across the county—offering family prevention services in homes, counseling in schools, in transitional homes for teens and young adults who have "aged out" of county or state assistance programs. Our big brick dormitory still operates in Cleveland, but it serves all of Ohio. When your local community cannot provide highly skilled, specialized treatment it sends boys to Cleveland Christian Home. And our satellite office in Barberton provides family preservation services for Summit County.

The Cleveland Christian Home, "Your Other Family," is a haven of hope and healing to children, youth and families struggling with mental illness, abuse and neglect. That means this year there are an extra 1500 people in your family. We couldn't do it without you.
